Brian's Table

I hope you had a chance to sit at Brian's table: Brian's table in the dining room. I mean Brian's most recent table in the dining room. For many years he sat at the table closest to the kitchen with Renate, David, Frank, Eunice and Vera. After covid when the dining room was only open for takeout meals, Brian joined Gerda, David, Jon, more recently Vadim and me at the large round table in the middle of the dining room. Why Brian's table? Why not David's table or Jon's table? Perhaps one had to be there. Brian held court at that table; it was definitely Brian's table.

Brian was a family man. Although divorced both he and his wife were always present at family celebrations and birthday dinners. They had three daughters, Cheryl, Nedi and Lorri, in that order. For some reason Brian found it expedient to refer to his children as Daughter #1, Daughter #2 and Daughter #3. In his small, long window facing the corridor one could admire the artwork of one of his great grandchildren. It was not the most sophisticated of pieces but spoke volumes about the man's love for his family. When Nedi still practised here at Hesperus she frequently came by at lunchtime to connect with her father. She would come from behind and place her hands on his shoulders and say "Hi Dad". The man's eyes took on a glow as he softened under her touch.

In his professional life our Brian was Dr. Eckler D.D.S. He practiced the art of dentistry. He was a trail blazer. He was left handed and didn't want to work within a right handed arrangement, so he became the first to have a dental chair and instruments set up on the left hand side of the patient, instead of the right. When I told him that I had worked for a dentist who practised near stop 14 on Kingston Road he was amazed. "That's where my first office was!" We had actually worked in the same building, albeit in different offices. There was a small family

restaurant across Kingston Road where Brian remembered meeting fellow dentists for lunch. He also remembered the bowling alley there, where I bowled with my high school bowling league. I went to R. H. King Collegiate, two bus stops away from Brian's office; the only high school in Scarborough then. We had a delightful time reminiscing about the area and discovering that we had this connection to each other many years before becoming fellow residents, and eventually friends at Hesperus.

Brian had a sparkling smile: One of those smiles that shone from his eyes and lit up his entire face. He always took your opening salvo and turned it back at you with a twist. Recently I heard of his ex-wife saying to him, "Well! You can still make me laugh!" Brian was a master at the pun and he and David knew so many colloquial sayings that they often mused about writing a book containing them all. Brian and Jon specialized in put-downs and Gerda loved to push Brian's buttons and get him going. Vadim grinned and shook his head at the lot of us carrying on. Yes, it was Brian's table. The first time after his passing when someone sat at his place I felt a twinge. But, that is life among elders. Hesperus has many shades lingering among our greying circles. Like Banquo, they are loathe to leave us.







This past Monday Morning Coffee was Birthday Monday. We would be celebrating YOU if you had a birthday this month. Please join us every Monday in the lobby at 10 am for coffee and a sweet. Please consider bringing a treat to share.

On Tuesday at 6:30 pm we presented a special Hesperus Film Club event featuring a documentary about Cobalt, a small mining community in northern Ontario. Dirty Laundry

Like all high-use appliances, our washers and dryers occasionally malfunction. Residents, if comfortable doing so, may phone Coinamatic directly, at 1-800-561-1972 to request a service call to 1 Hesperus Rd, Thornhill. Found on the front of each washer and dryer is a unique six-digit machine ID, which can be referred to. If you prefer not to contact Coinamatic yourself, please feel free to raise a work order at hesperus.ca/resident-use or at the office. Regardless, Hesperus should be notified of which machine is not working.

Royal Flush

Please do not flush paper towels down the toilet in our public washrooms, or in your own washroom. Flush only toilet paper. Paper towels do not break down like toilet paper and can clog pipes, leading to extensive damage and costly repairs. Likewise, do not flush food scraps, plant matter, personal hygiene products or other garbage down the toilet.

Decor No More?


Firmly Planted

The indoor plants found throughout Hesperus add a welcome touch of nature to our public spaces and help to clean the air. But indoor plants require regular attention to survive and thrive. That's where our plant stewards—a team of residents who care for the plants in designated areas—come in. We already have a list of stewards for all but the 2nd-floor alcoves and spaces around the 2nd-floor elevators. Plant stewards may repair, repot and remove plants as they see fit, and plants will be removed from areas without a designated steward. This is to ensure that all our plants receive adequate care. If you are interested in becoming a steward, please speak to Raphael, or contact the office.

An abundance of indoor plants means that Hesperus would like to limit donations of new plants at this time. Additionally, upcoming entryway standards may affect a small number of personal plants in the building. Guidelines will be shared with residents in April.

A message from TWS teacher, Robyn Stevan

On Friday, March 1st, eighteen Grade 11 students from TWS went over to Hesperus to share with the residents a dramatic presentation of some stories they had written. These stories were inspired by tales told to them from an elder person in each of their own lives.

What transpired that day was something even more special than I could have asked for or imagined. I left time, after Grade 11 had taken their places on "stage" and before they started, for the residents at Hesperus to stand up, if they were able, and to share, if they so chose, a little about themselves with the Grade 11 students. And I am so appreciative of each one of the Hesperus residents who had gathered there that day. There were so many spontaneous and beautiful stories told—some about the building of the school, some about the mice that used to scurry across the floor during class, some about the rain that used to come in before the roof was fully built... it was marvellous!

The transformation in the Grade 11 students was palpable as they were standing there listening to all of these stories. Their hearts opened, their backs straightened, and they then stepped up for their turn with a newfound purpose and reverence, to rise up to the warmth and spirit that these elders had created in the room.

The Grade 11s all spoke loudly, clearly, and from their hearts—it was beautiful! When it was done, the Grade 11s served the elders cookies and helped to stack all the chairs.

It was thrilling for me to see how this project, something I have been trying to establish as an annual event, could take flight in a way that could find connection and meaning across the generations.

Thank you to all who contributed to that day, and an extra special thanks to Shani Brothers for helping to organize it all.

My Experience of a Home Care Program - Anna Carling



A few weeks ago, I learned about a 6 week exercise program offered by OHIP.

The beauty of this program is that you don't have to go anywhere but practice the assigned exercises at your own home.

This involves licensed physio therapists and occupational therapists who provide you with instructions to practice the given exercises twice a day within a 6 week period.

You are given a paper with pictures and short explanation of the positions you are to practice twice each day. This will activate muscles in your body that are under used.

For me, having practiced Chinese medicine so many decades, this was a revelation, a completely different approach to awaken unused muscles. The second or third day after having started, the muscles ached slightly, as this happens when not using them for a long time.

Some of the arm exercises call for a weight held in your hand. I could not find my exercise weights so I used a can of beans in my hand as I moved my arms slowly through a required position. On his second visit George, the leading licensed physio therapist added a few more positions.

By keeping the pictures of the positions on my kitchen table I am reminded during the day. I also do a position or two when performing other tasks such as waiting for water to boil.

I'm now on my 6th week of the program which I practice each morning as well as evening before going to bed. Doing this helps to relax my body for a deep sleep.

This free government sponsored program has been offered for many years, but is known by few. Ruth Weinmann, who passed away last year was over 100 years of age. She had participated in this Home Care Program.



- DO NOT ANSWER INNOCOUS QUESTIONS LIKE "NAME OF FIRST PET, MOTHERS MAIDEN NAME.
